

The first time I saw an Austin Healey was in the parking lot of Luigis Pizza, located on 9th east and 21st south Salt Lake City, Utah. This particular pizza parlor was a hang-out for many teenagers during the early 1960's. While at Luigis with friends I heard a car drive into the parking lot---it was the coolest sounding car I have ever heard. I had to check it out so I went to the parking lot and discovered the car was an Austin Healey. Not only did that car sound so distinctively but the beauty of it was unmatched to any other vehicle I had ever seen. I knew right then at that moment I had to have one; but no money. After graduating from Judge Memorial high school I began working for the largest mine in North America, Kennecott, the income provided ensured me I could buy my teenage dream car---so I bought it. My first Austin Healey was a 1959 100 and boy did I have fun, a little too much fun I would race anything and everything and eventually blew the engine so the 59 100 went into the shop. The engine was repaired by Kurt's Carburetors on 17th South and State Street. Kurt knew Austin Healey's and gave me a solid price. Once repaired I was out doing the same thing "RACING" State Street in the 60's was known for off the light racing to see who was the fastest.

Shortly after blowing up engines and all the racing, Uncle Sam sent me his greetings: I had been drafted. The 59 100 was being stored at my parents house and I was sent off to basic training. After basic I was given military leave and while home I found out my younger brother was driving my car and racing it. Immediately I asked my mother to sell

the car and she sold it for \$165.00. My next leave was scheduled for Christmas and that is when I married my soul mate Peggy Long. Her father bought her a one way ticket to Belgium (where I was stationed) and stated "if I wanted her back in the states I'd have to pay her fare to come home). I was discharged from the military service in 1969 and once home Peggy and I started a family. At home and with-out the pressure of the military I began day-dreaming about my glory days and that 1959 100---I wanted to buy another Healey badly; but with two children Sascha the oldest and Emberly the second and my third child on the way I could not find a Healey that I could afford.

My wife Peggy gave birth to our third child Rafher on February 23' 1976 at St. Marks hospital where the two spent ten days there and on March 04' 1976 I drove to pick them up from the hospital. At a stop light on 9th East and 39th South I spotted an Austin Healey traveling west with a for sale sign in plain view, I rapidly flipped a U-turn and was in pursuit with the pedal to the floor and the RPMs close to red line it brought me back to my good old racing days. You are all fully aware these Healey's are fast so it took a little time for me to catch up, finally I caught up to the driver and followed him to his home. The car he was driving was my baby, an Austin Healey 1963 BJ7 and right away the bartering began. He wanted \$1500.00 PERIOD and would not budge a dime (he needed the money for dental school), with my wife and new baby waiting I was pressed for time so I agreed and gave the gentleman a \$100.00 deposit with the remaining \$1400.00 given the next day upon pick-up.

With the new bundle of joy and Peggy by my side I told her about what had happened on the way to the hospital and asked her if I could buy the car, she loved the idea because our very first date was in the 59 100 and another Austin Healey would only bring more reasonable memories. So the next day I bought the 63 BJ7 and the car and I have been together ever since. Through-out the years that followed I have done many up-grades and replaced numerous parts to the 63 BJ7 and although these upgrades are not up to spec with original restoration standards the things I have done have worked for me. I vividly remember while being a

teenager changing a flat tire on the 59 100. I placed the jack stand on the rear of the bumper and tried to raise the car---needless to say it almost tore the bumper off (things teenagers do). Older and wiser now I assure you all that I am not that reckless with the BJ7 and now know the proper ways to change a flat tire on an Austin Healey; but am proud to say I have done almost all restoration work to BJ7 on my own. Although not Healey right the work done is right for me.

While reading the paper years ago there was an advertisement from the Bonneville Austin Healey Club stating the organization was having a meeting in Park City, Utah. Peggy and I immediately sought interest and drove to Park City and that is where we met all of you.

The club and its' members have shown me so much throughout the years in regards to keeping my BJ7 healthy and strong the slave clutch, rocker shaft assembly, window and much much more. I thank the club for being there for me and my BJ7.

Editor's Report: If anyone is interested in the Editor's position for 2013, please put your name in consideration at the November BAHC meeting.


Activities: The participants reported that a wonderful time was had by all on the Torrey/Zion trip.
